Abbott Philippines

Abbott has been operating in the Philippines for 70 years and provides Filipinos with a diverse range of nutrition, pharmaceutical and medical products, and diagnostic tests. Abbott has approximately 500 employees in the Philippines.

Primary Businesses

- **Nutrition Products** – Abbott offers a variety of nutrition products for infants, children, active adults and patients with special dietary needs. Key products include GainPlus[®] and Grow[®], PediaSure[®], Similac[®] Advance and Ensure[®].
- **Pharmaceuticals** – Core therapeutic areas include infectious diseases, hypertension and metabolic diseases. Key products include the antibiotic Klaricid[®], Isoniazid[®] for hypertension and Reductil[®] anti-obesity medicine.
- **Medical Products** – Key lines of business are laboratory and molecular diagnostics, vascular and diabetes care. Key products include the XIENCE V[™] drug-eluting stent, laboratory diagnostic instruments ARCHITECT[®] and AxSYM[®], and Optium Xceed[™] and Optium Omega personal blood glucose meters.

Citizenship

Global citizenship is an integral part of Abbott's mission to improve people's lives in the Philippines and around the world. Responsible citizenship is critical to Abbott's long-term competitiveness, and is reflected in how it conducts business as a global company, protects the environment and builds healthier communities.

- Since 2006, Abbott has distributed more than US\$7.5 million in nutritional and pharmaceutical products in the Philippines to expand access to health care.
- Abbott and the Abbott Fund have supported Operation Smile's efforts to perform more than 1,800 surgeries to repair childhood facial deformities and train more than 420 medical personnel in the Philippines.
- Abbott supports victims of typhoons with food, clothing and household goods and helps implement elementary and high school level educational programs, working in partnership with PHAPCares Foundation, Elsie Gaches Village, Missionaries of Charity, Order of Malta and other local organizations.
